Déclaration de Geneve

(Adoptée par le Conseil général de l'Union Internationale de Secours aux Enfants dans sa session du 23 février 1923, votée définitivement par le Consté exécutif dans sa séance du 17 mai 1928, et signée par les membres du Conseil général le 28 février 1924)

Lar la présente Déclaration des Droits de l'Enfant, dite Déclaration de Genève, les hommes et les femmes de loutes les nations, reconnaissant que l'Humanité doit donner à l'enfant ce qu'elle a de meilleur, affirment leurs devoirs, en dehons de toute considération de race, de nationalité et de croyance:

- 1. L'Enfant doit être mis en mesure de se développer d'une façon normale, matériellement et spirituellement.
- 2. L'Enfant qui a faim doit être nouvri, l'enfant malade doit être soigné, l'enfant arrière doit être encouragé, l'enfant dévoyé doit être ramené, l'orphelin et l'abandonne doivent être recueilles et secourus.
- 3. L'Enfant doit être le premier à recevoir des secours en temps de débresse.
- 4. L'Enfant doit être mis en mesure de gagner sa vie et doit être prolégé contre toute exploitation.
- 5. L'Enfant doit être élevé dans le sentiment que ses meilleures qualités devront être mises au service de ses frères.

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Declaration of the Rights of the Child

The first declaration of the rights of the child by the League of Nations in 1924 recognized that "mankind owes to the child the best that it has to give."



1959 Declaration of the Rights of the Child United Nations General Assembly in Resolution 1386 (XIV)

- 1. The right to equality, without distinction on account of race, religion or national origin.
- 2. The right to special protection for the child's physical, mental and social development.
- 3. The right to a name and a nationality.
- 4. The right to adequate nutrition, housing and medical services.
- 5. The right to special education and treatment when a child is physically or mentally handicapped.
- 6. The right to understanding and love by parents and society.
- 7. The right to recreational activities and free education.
- 8. The right to be among the first to receive relief in all circumstances.
- 9. The right to protection against all forms of neglect, cruelty and exploitation.
- 10. The right to be brought up in a spirit of understanding, tolerance, friendship among peoples, and universal brotherhood.

RECOVERY AND REINTEGRATION

September 2 nd 1990 The Convention becomes part of	International Law
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April 19th 1991 The government of **United Kingdom** became a signatory to the Convention

August 29th 1991 The government of **People's Republic of China** became a signatory to the Convention

December 16th 1991 The ratification of the Convention by the government of United Kingdom received at the United Nations

March 2nd 1992 The ratification of the Convention by the People's Republic of China received at the United Nations

September 7th 1994 The United Kingdom extended the ratification of the Convention to **Hong Kong**

Protection Against Child Abuse in Hong Kong

- Convention on the Rights of the Child (CRC)
- CRC cannot be invoked as an authority for legal enforcement in Hong Kong
- Hong Kong: Child abuse covered in Crimes Ordinance CAP 200 and Offences Against the Person Ordinance CAP 212
- Social Welfare Department: "...endanger or impair physical or psychological health and development of an individual under the age of 18"
- Child Abuse Investigation Unit (CAIU): HK Police
- Family and Child Protective Services Unit (FCPSU): SWD

Juvenile Offenders

- <u>Section 3</u> of the <u>Juvenile Offenders Ordinance</u> (JOO), <u>Cap. 226</u>, contains an irrebuttable presumption that a person under 10 years of age cannot commit a criminal offence.
- Under section 2 of the JOO a "child" is defined as a person under the age of 14 years
- A "young person" is a person of 14 years of age or over, but under 16 years of age.
- The juvenile court only has jurisdiction over persons who have not attained 16 years of age.









Child Employment in Hong Kong

For the purposes of the <u>Employment Ordinance</u>, the <u>Employment of Children Regulations</u> and the <u>Employment of Young Persons (Industry) Regulations</u>:


- A child is a person under 15 years of age.
- A young person is a person who has attained 15 years, but not the age of 18 years.











Hong Kong Mandatory Reporting Bill Gazetted 2 June 2023

- 1. 25 professions required to report suspected child abuse
- 2. Penalty for failure to report: three months' imprisonment and \$50,000 fine
- 3. Under consultation
- 4. Will take effect no less than 18 months after gazetting









Chief Executive's Policy Address 2023 (25 October 2023)

124. The LegCo is scrutinising the Mandatory Reporting of Child Abuse Bill. We look forward to the early passage of the bill and the implementation of the mandatory reporting regime for early identification and intervention into child abuse cases.









Four Types of Maltreatment

Neglect

Persistent failure to meet a child's needs – physical and/or psychological

Physical Harm/Abuse

Causing physical harm to a child

Sexual Abuse

Involving a child in sexual activity

Psychological Harm/Abuse

Persistent emotional ill treatment of a child









General Indicators

- Patterns of Attendance
- Nature and quantity of contact with parents/domestic helpers
- Nature and quantity of contact with school staff; frequently seeking out attention and/or reassurance
- Inappropriate sexual behaviour
- Body language and behaviour
- Language: Either explicit or ambiguous
- Verbal/physical outbursts, challenging, disruptive









Child Safeguarding & Protection

Child Safeguarding is action that is taken to promote the welfare of children and to protect them from harm.

Safeguarding means:

- protecting children from abuse and maltreatment
- preventing harm to children's health or development
- ensuring children grow up with the provision of safe and effective care
- taking action in the best interests of children and young people

Child protection is part of the safeguarding process. It focuses on protecting individual children identified as suffering or likely to suffer significant harm









Safeguarding is at the heart of what we do



Definitions of Child Abuse/Maltreatment

In a broad sense, child maltreatment is defined as any act of commission or omission that endangers or impairs the physical/psychological health and development of an individual under the age of 18. ISF takes its duty of care to extend to all of its currently enrolled students, regardless of when the incident took place, age and including those who may have reached or surpassed the age of 18.

Child maltreatment is committed by individuals, singly or collectively, who, by their characteristics (e.g. age, status, knowledge, organisational form), are in a position of differential power that renders a child vulnerable.










Types of Child Abuse Cases reported in Hong Kong In 2022

Types of abuse	Number of cases	% of cases
Sexual abuse	443	30.8%
Psychological harm/abuse	15	1.0%
Physical harm/abuse	652	45.3%
Neglect	276	19.2%
Multiple harm/abuse	53	3.7%

Standards and Expectations for Child Protection (Council of International Schools)

- All children have equal rights to be protected from harm and abuse.
- Everyone has a responsibility to support the protection of children.
- Schools have a duty of care to children enrolled in the school and those who are affected by the operations of the school.
- All actions on child protection are taken with consideration for the best interests of the child, which are paramount.

Safeguarding at ISF

- Making sure children grow up safe, happy and healthy
- Be alert to changes in a child
- All children are vulnerable, but some are more vulnerable than others

- There are Designated Child Safeguarding Leads at Pre-School, Primary and Secondary School; They work together to address the concerns and take necessary actions to keep children safe

From December 1, 2023 onwards, we will use our new name Li Ren and the team will be called the Li Ren Center.


